# A Message From Your Chairman

#### **Form of Government**

Horry County has been operating under the Council/Administrator form of government since 1975. Under this type of government each member of council is elected from the district in which he/she lives and a chairman is elected at-large. The council consists of a chairman and 11 council members; each elected for four-year terms. The Council appoints a Clerk to Council, Register of Deeds Director and an Administrator.

# **Program Highlights Fiscal Year 04-05**

## **Twenty-Four New Commercial & Agricultural Districts**

In fiscal year 04-05, Horry County Council tasked its planning staff to review, update and rewrite its aging zoning ordinance. Upon review of the effort required to complete this task, staff determined the best and first step was to restructure the zoning ordinance and incorporate new zoning classifications. It was thought that the existing zoning districts allowed too many uses, which were causing conflict among adjacent property owners in many instances. The planning staff, working with the Planning Commission, developed 24 new commercial and agricultural zoning classifications that the Council adopted. All new commercial and agricultural rezoning requests must utilize a new classification. There will not be a comprehensive rezoning so the old zoning districts will remain and will phase out over time as rezoning occurs. The new zoning classes have been written to group similar uses together and to minimize the number of uses in each district.



## **Two New Recycling Centers**

Horry County Council funded two new recycling facilities in the fiscal year 04-05 budget. A full-service, manned convenience center was constructed on Scipio Lane on the south end of the Grand Strand and opened on August 24, 2005. The cost to construct the facility was \$198,856 (included containers). The facility provides for collection of municipal solid waste, as well as other recycled items such as newspapers, cardboard, metal and yard debris. A mini-recycling facility was constructed on Kings Road, near the Highway 22 interchange, that offers separate containers for the public to drop off recyclable items such as newspaper, plastic, aluminum, glass and cardboard. This

facility is not manned, however it is open to the public 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The facility was completed on July 18, 2005, at a cost of \$38,385 (included containers and site work). An agreement was reached with the City of Myrtle Beach to allow joint use of the cities existing facility at 10th Avenue North so county residents can drop off recyclable items at this location.

### **New Conway Library**

Horry County Council funded the construction of the new Conway Library, located on Main Street in Conway, as a capital project in the fiscal year 04-05 and 05-06 budgets. Construction

began in January 2005 and will complete in July 2006. The Conway Library is a two-story brick veneer structure with 22,000 square-feet of conditioned space. The budget for this project is \$4.2 million. This project included utilities and site improvements that will be shared with the future County Museum facility, which will be housed in the Old Burroughs School. The new library will house 80,000 books,




DVDs, CDs, paperbacks, large-type and audio books. The library will host 20 computers for the public to access as well as a public meeting room, a young adult area, and a separate children's area, which will include its own programming room with eight computers. The library will be handicap accessible and will feature an enlarged outdoor book return area.

## Local Comprehensive Road Improvement Plan Update

Horry County adopted its local road plan and began its implementation in fiscal year 97-98. The plan is designed to develop a more efficient and effective method of improving the county's unimproved road network while at the same time initiating a pavement management program for the county's paved roads.

The county's road plan has been very successful in its first eight years, where we average paving approximately 14 miles annually. However, the need to adjust the mileage goal was necessary in year nine (fiscal year 05-06) due to increased construction costs. An additional \$500,000 commitment from the County Transportation Committee revised the reduction to one-half mile vs. the 1.5 miles reduction that staff felt was necessary as the fiscal year 05-06 budget was prepared. The road plan is continuing this fiscal year. The table illustrates the programmed mileage of improvements compared to the actual mileage completed.

# Communications Upgrade Project

### 800 MHz Radio System Upgrade

Horry County has upgraded its 800 MHz Trunked Radio System. These upgrades include new consoles in the E911 facility, and two new tower sites. This upgrade provides a reliable, public safety communication system with outstanding coverage countywide.

#### **Fiber Network**

Horry County has been working on the development of a system to connect county facilities, municipalities and other key locations on a county-owned fiber network. This project is nearing completion and will provide a high-speed, digital backbone to share data and resources.

# Computer Aided Dispatch System (CAD)

The new Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system is scheduled to go on-line in early 2006. This new system is a state-of-the-art computer application, that is Wireless Phase 2 compliant. This means that when a wireless telephone (cellular) calls 911, the system will be able to provide a real-time, dynamic location of the caller. The efficiencies of the new system will provide a better response time to citizens in need of emergency assistance.



# Construction of Four New Fire/Rescue Stations

Horry County Council funded the construction of four new fire/rescue stations out of one of the county's fire bonds. The Finklea project is a three-bay station located on Hwy. 917, with a final project cost of \$578,865.34. The Iron Springs project is a two-bay station located

on Fair Bluff Highway, with a final project cost of \$549,487.76. Construction on these two stations began in April 2004 and was completed in March 2005. The Hickory Grove project is a two-bay station located on Old Reeve's Ferry Road, with a final project cost of \$750,000.00. The Lee's Landing project is also a two-bay station located on Highway 90, with a project cost of 706,000.00. Construction on these stations began in July 2004 and was completed in May 2005.

## **Aerial Imagery Project 2005**

Horry County has contracted for the collection of aerial imagery for the entire county. The flight was accomplished during February and March 2005. Image delivery began in July and will continue thru January 2006. This project was planned to update the imagery currently maintained by the county, especially due to all of the growth being experienced. The orthophotography project was needed to update photography that was out-of-date, since the entire county was last flown in 1998, and only a partial re-flight was completed in 2001. The 2005 project was designed to provide color imagery for the entire county at the 0.5-foot pixel resolution requirement. The project also included the acquisition of Lidar



data and infrared imagery. These additional datasets provide the county with a complete analysis set of information from imagery to elevation data. The contract required digital imagery, providing a higher quality of imagery as well as a much timelier delivery schedule for the data. Numerous departments in the county including all public safety, assessor, stormwater, etc. will use this imagery.

# Ongoing Projects Fiscal Year 05-06

### **Fiscal Year 05-06 Budget Highlights**

#### 14 New Infrastructure & Regulation Employees (\$521,010)

The Code Enforcement, Engineering, Planning and Zoning Departments have experienced dramatic workload increases since 2002. In the fiscal year 05-06 budget, Horry County Council approved increased staffing in these departments. The additional staff was needed to meet daily demands, maintain adequate levels of service in these departments and was funded by permit fees.

### **Police Precinct Plan**

The Horry County Council funded 29 additional police officers for the Horry County Police Department, which will allow for the implementation of the new Precinct Plan. The unincorporated portion of the county will be broken into three separate geographical areas, and each will have a Police Precinct Headquarters. The new officers, along with other restructuring, will provide approximately eight additional officers per shift, who will be assigned to answer emergency calls for service.

# **Animal Shelter Enhancement Project**

The Horry County Animal Shelter has been funded this fiscal year to make several major improvements. Funding has been provided to replace the inmate labor with professional staff at the facility, and funding has been provided to construct an Adoption Center on-site. These enhancements are critical to the shelter fulfilling its mission to provide humane treatment of animals in our care.



# Comprehensive Plan Re-write

In 1999, Horry County adopted its countywide Comprehensive Plan pursuant to the requirements of the 1994 South Carolina Planning Enabling Act. The Comprehensive Plan is a set of community goals and strategies for implementation that present a vision for the future of Horry County. It serves as a flexible blueprint to guide decision-making by policy makers, community organizations and private property owners. The Comprehensive Plan consists of maps and written policy statements, including goals and objectives, addressing issues relating to growth, housing, economic development, transportation, environment, parks and open space conservation, aesthetics, community character, and neighborhood and historic preservation.

The Planning Department, at the request of County Council, is currently in the process of a full revision of the plan due to the significant, countywide growth that has occurred since its adoption in 1999. This process began in Spring 2005 with a "kick-off" meeting and several community-based public information meetings. Anticipated completion of the revision process is expected to occur by late 2006.

## **Budget Summary Fiscal Year 04-05**

# Budget Summary – Fiscal Year 04-05

Horry County is continuing to experience unprecedented growth since the early 1980s. Growth is the result of a combination of factors including a strong economy, a maturing market place and a fast-growing tourist base. Horry County recognizes this growth and is anticipating this trend to stabilize within the next five years.

During fiscal year 04-05, the county tax revenue continued to grow at a rate of 2.5 to four percent depending on the fund. Revenues associated with property development and land transfers continued to exceed past performances and intergovernmental resources from the state have returned to near the 2004 levels.

The countywide tax level of 50.9 mils continued for fiscal year 04-05 and the mileage for the county unincorporated garbage collection system increased by 2.0 mils, while all other special district mileage remained the same. Code Enforcement and Register of Deeds fees were increased in fiscal year 04-05, which increased county revenues by \$2.5 million and are expected to return a similar revenue level for fiscal year 05-06.

Horry County Council funded \$772,000 for software programs for county assessors, planners and engineers, \$750,000 for phase 2 of the county's emergency 9-1-1 upgrade, \$700,000 for the Register of Deeds computer index software, \$612,000 for the county's Mosquito Abatement Program including ground and aerial spraying, \$500,000 for aerial photography, \$305,000 for additional public works equipment and \$73,313 for the Horry County Museum upgrades and personnel.

### **Revenue Sources**

Taxes – the county's source of tax revenue is the real, personal and vehicle taxes levied against the citizen. Taxes are 53 percent of the total General Fund revenue source and are based on the assessed value of property. The county's estimated assessed value for all real property, personal property and vehicles as of June 30, 2004, was \$1,176,002,724. A taxpayer would multiply the appraised value by the assessment rate to determine the assessed value of the property. The assessment rate of all property is determined by the State of South Carolina as shown in the adjacent chart:

Although a taxpayer receives just one property tax bill, there are other agencies that utilize that one tax bill. These agencies are itemized on your bill, which include the School District, municipalities, special tax districts, etc. Any increase by any of these agencies will result in an increase to the overall tax bill. Tax revenues are projected to increase steadily. One current collectable mill of tax is projected to generate \$1,200,500, for fiscal year 04-05 versus \$1,182,763, projected for fiscal year 03-04.

# **Budget Summary Fiscal Year 04-05**


### **Expenditure Highlights**

The fiscal year 04-05 budget maintained the status quo on operating expenditures for most of the operating funds. The General Fund included 32 new positions and a 3.5 percent cost-of-living adjustment for all employees. County Council also approved the funding of \$4.5 million from excess fund balance above the mandated minimum for several large Information Technology (IT) long-term capital projects, capital equipment and new personnel. Some of the IT projects that were funded included a new


indexing system, aerial photography, CAMA and land development software, and 9-1-1 upgrades. The operating portion of the \$4.5 million appropriation amounted to \$870,970, and included 15 new positions.

In addition, County Council continued to fund 100 percent of the employee-only portion of health insurance and the cost of the employee-only portion increased \$19.04 a month for each employee. Health insurance now exceeds \$7 million annually.
